 - LIS traditional splits info seeking vs. info retrieval, etc.
 - Topics of study


One Path to SSI

What We Had In Common

- Background or interest in STS
 (=Science & Technology Studies,
 or Science, Technology & Society)
- Participants at the Society for Social Studies of Science (4S) meetings, which are
 - Fast growing,
 - Pluralistic drawing far beyond core STS programs
 - Yet have an identifiable set of core concerns and methods
- No current community encompasses all those with STS interests in the iSchool world
- In iSchool context we have gathered around "information" rather than "science"
 - Therefore "Social Studies of Information"
